## **Books going digital:** What've we got to lose?

	With printed books:	With DRM'd ebooks:
privacy:	You can buy one with cash, anonymously.	You identify yourself to get an ebook.
ownership:	You own it.	You are always treated like you are renting the book.
storage:	You can keep your book wherever you like.	You can only read the book on authorized devices.
usability:	You don't need to sign a license restricting how you use the book.	You sign a license restricting how you may use the ebook.
software:	You don't need a special app to read the book.	You need approved apps to read the book.
sharing:	You can give, lend or sell the book to a friend.	You can lend some ebooks, but never sell or pass them on.
copying:	You can, physically, scan and copy the book.	You can't copy the ebook for any reason.
copyright:	Does its job.	Is irrelevant and fair use gone as the ebook is locked forever.
burning:	Nobody has the power to destroy your book but you.	Ebooks can be remotely deleted as Amazon did to 1984.

## Ebooks don't have to be this way.

Ebooks have the incredible potential to make information so much more accessible, but currently **DRM** is being used to deliberately make ebooks less functional than books.

We should have the freedom to use our books whenever, wherever and however we want.

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
