





THE FOUR FREEDOMS

The Four Freedoms are the conditions that define free software – software that respects your freedom and community. The Free Software Foundation (FSF) protects your right to control the technology that you use and own.

<p>FREEDOM 0: USE</p>  <p>Run the program as you wish, for any purpose.</p>	<p>FREEDOM 1: STUDY AND EDIT/IMPROVE</p>  <p>Study how the program works, and change it so that it does your computing as you wish. This requires access to source code.</p>
<p>FREEDOM 2: SHARE COPIES OF ORIGINAL</p>  <p>Redistribute copies of the original software program.</p>	<p>FREEDOM 3: SHARE COPIES OF YOUR CHANGES</p>  <p>Distribute copies of your modified versions to others, so the entire community can benefit. This also requires access to source code.</p>
